Davis' own line, Salvaged Hearts, incorporates repurposed chair frames with leftover fabrics and leathers.


The Sunset Interior team prides itself on the loyal relationship it builds with clients, along with offering quality products.

Inspired by regional projects, Dara says, "I love to glean the unique style of whatever part of the country I'm working in, and I love all the different aspects of the West."





Stick to the classics in a small office space. A well-chosen desk and comfortable chairs become old friends that withstand the test of time.



REMEMBER THE BAD, old days when the ultimate in patio décor was made up of a couple of featherweight lounges with aluminum frames and plastic-strapped upholstery? They were the sort of thing that blew into the pool during monsoon season.

Today's options are light years away from all that. Think big when you think about decorating the patio: Sofas so heavy that a hurricane can't even bump them; deep seating for super-size bodies; "cuddle" chairs where two can nestle at the same time; chaises as wide as a double bed; and some sofa cushions that are 9-inches wide and 48-inches deep. Add an 11-foot high umbrella and you can plop down and snooze without catching too many rays.

"The big trend now is to think of your patio as an outdoor living room," says Tom Tudor, co-owner of House'n Garden in Tucson with his wife, Joanne.

At the same time, Arizona residents aren't dining outside as much anymore. They grill steaks and then take them inside to eat.

"It's too much of a hassle to take everything outside," Tom Tudor says. "But you still might have drinks and hors d'oeuvres under a covered porch."

Because of that trend, says Joanne Tudor, more and more outdoor lovers are buying coffee tables at a "conversational height — instead of 18 or 19 inches tall, they want 20 to 24 inches tall."

That's the perfect height for appetizers and drinks in the evening or coffee and croissants in the morning. And those mega furnishings help fill mega spaces in today's

"People really want those deep seated, big-cushioned sofas," says Joanne Tudor.

Decorator Dara Davis of Sunset Interiors in the North Tucson area advises clients that because of the mild climate, and if they have a covered patio, they can use vintage sofas and cover them in canvas — a unique way to take the indoors outdoors.

"You can use Mexican pine pieces and equipale tables and chairs (made of pigskin leather) from Mexico," she says. "On my patio, I have a metal table and chairs, paintings on the walls and an Oriental rug. I also did canvas draperies on the pillars."

Colors are rowdier than ever. Bye-bye beige and neutrals; the current rage is for terra cotta or brick red. And bright solids get mixed in with stripes and patterns used on pillows and cushions. One Laneventure grouping done by famed designer Bob Timberlake features wicker that can be ordered in 150 different colors.

As David McCarroll, general manager of Sedona Patio stores and manufacturing company, points out: "Arizonans can spend a good part of their time outdoors and they want to take advantage of it. This isn't Michigan where you have to head for cover after dark or bring out a mosquito net."


Much of what national manufacturers come up with seems particularly designed to suit Arizona — in particular our industrial-strength sunshine. There are lifetime warranties now on wicker, both natural and synthetic. And the Sunbrella fabrics that major manufacturers use are guaranteed to fade only one percent a year.


Today's outdoor metal pieces are treated so they will not rust or corrode. At Patio Connection in Tucson, you can order metal-framed groupings like Atlantis and Regency from Mallin Casual Furniture. The aluminum frames are painted to look like wood. Unless you tap on them, it's hard to know that they're metal.

At Sedona Patio, which manufactures its own products in a Phoenix factory, frames are made of hand-forged iron, powder coated "to last many lifetimes,"

Glass tabletops are still available, but more and more customers buy a table frame and add custom tops of mosaic, faux stone, granite, marble and hammered copper, according to Mike Moon of Patio Connection.

All this outdoor luxury comes at a pretty price. It's easy to spend as much or more on your patio as your great room. But you can get higher quality than what was available 10 to 20 years ago. Despite the cost, the trend has caught fire with buyers, and some companies are expanding. Sedona Patio has five stores, including one in Las Vegas, and will add one on Oracle Road in Tucson later this year. ■










Additional items were chosen to lend a Western, contemporary vibe. "Some of the pieces in the living room were handmade from reclaimed wood," Davis says. "But even though the wood is rustic and might be 100 years old, the lines are clean and crisp."


With the background and major furnishings in place, Davis and the homeowners enjoyed placing artwork and accessories collected over time, including pots, paintings and figurines, as well as family photos and memorabilia, throughout the house and outside living spaces.

While the photos remain constant, including a special one of the wife's mother, the accessories do move around a bit. "I find different fun things every time we visit Mexico," the wife says. "Some are expensive, some aren't expensive at all. I just mix them all together because they remind me of our time there."


Now, time in Tucson is just as memorable for the couple and their extended family, offering a special beauty and a natural link to their ties to Mexico.



The living or great room is long and narrow, so different shapes were used to break up the space.

"You have to be careful or that kind of space can end up looking like a railroad car," Davis said.

A custom area rug with a modified square look anchors the couch and chairs on the wide-plank hardwood flooring. A round table occupies the dining room. Drapes are used in the dining room, and some cornice boxes make fine additions as well. Tables and chairs have traditional styling.

"There's a great cabinet in the living room with a TV that goes up and down," Nobles said. "Another cabinet in the dining room has a bar in it."

Nobles especially likes the Western-style fabrics used on the drapes and bedspread in the master bedroom, with their bright colors and a hint of Navajo-style geometric shapes. There's even a leather bench at the foot of the queen-size bed. Chunky, rustic wooden end tables and hardwood flooring complete the look.

Bathrooms in the house carry a faux-finish. The color scheme includes sage green, pale gold, chocolate brown and rich, rusty reds. Not a sign of pink or turquoise anywhere here. ■
